Vol 1 rebooted as a second series Vol 1, in Dec. 1918. The two volume 1s are distinguished as war-series and new-series or 1a and 1b here.

Unit Histories and personal memoirs

One of the several post-war activities of *Liaison* was serving as Alumni magazine of the war-time expanded Coast Artillery / Heavy Artillery Bde. (CA). As such, it solicited unit history articles for the newsletter - typically serialized - and announcements of Unit History book projects launch and publication. Final issues have current mailing addresses of former officers by unit, with promise that that function will move to the Journal after last issue of *Liaison*.

Nearly all the announced unit history books have been found as on-line scans.

Liaison editors provided the following list, which I augment with references to related Liaison unit article and to the resulting book if found:

"The histories of the 47th and 71st Artillery CAC have already been published. Histories of the 31st 55th 56th 57th and 58th Artillery CAC are now being prepared. Information regarding these histories may be obtained from the following persons.

Fort/Fortress abbreviated Ft in title/caption or added as a topic thus, so Ft Monroe should find all.

Searches should be case-insensitive as some titles are FULL CAPS and are not reduced to standard.

Acronyms&initialisms are mostly compressed, no periods or spaces, where useful for search;

eg CA, FA, CAC, ROTC RAR YMCA AEF ;
exceptions are H.A.S C.A.T.C C.A.S. and where redundant / assumed.

*(side note: The 155 GPF and 155 De Bang are associated in CDSG lore with CAC but were simultaneously the largest guns in the FA Bde's and FA Regt's as Heavy FA **and** generally the smallest guns in HA/CA Bdes. In the period in question, 4 to 6 inch (6" ~ 155mm) were classed as **medium caliber**. Generally there was (one) 155mm Regt and two 75mm Regt per FA Bde, excepting Corps Artillery FA Bde which sometimes was (Two) 155mm Heavy FA Regt's, and no light. Heavy FA 155mm could also have 155mm "court" (short) or Howitzer as well as Longue De Bange or GPF, whatever was available. (CA Regts in HA Bde would AFAIK have only Long 155s.) Open Question: Did Heavy FA 155 crews and officers go to The Heavy Artillery School AEF, or did the FA have their own training for 155 short, deBang, and GPF units?)*
